

Delhi Police Driver Exam Syllabus - 2025

Scheme of Examination:

The examination will consist of following stages:

- (i) Computer Based Examination,
- (ii) Physical Endurance and Measurement Test (PE&MT),
- (iii) Trade Test,
- (iv) Medical Examination of the recommended candidates.

Marks scored by candidates in Computer Based Examination, if conducted in multiple shifts, will be normalized by using the formula published by the Commission through Notice No: 1-1/2018-P&P-I dated 07-02-2019 and such normalized scores will be used to determine final merit and cut-off marks.

Computer Based Examination:

The Computer Based Examination will consist of one objective type multiple choice paper containing 100 questions carrying 100 marks, with the following composition:

There will be negative marking of 0.25 marks for each wrong answer. The examination will be conducted in English and Hindi only.

Syllabus for Computer Based Examination:

Part A: General Awareness

Questions will test the candidate's general awareness, knowledge of current events, and everyday observations from a scientific perspective. Topics include India and neighboring countries, Sports, History, Culture, Geography, Indian Economy, General Polity, Indian Constitution, and Scientific Research. These questions will not require specialized study.

Part B: Reasoning (General Intelligence)

This section assesses analytical aptitude and ability to recognize and distinguish patterns, mainly through nonverbal reasoning. Topics include analogies, similarities and differences, spatial visualization and orientation, visual memory, discrimination, observations, relationship concepts, arithmetic reasoning, figural classification, number series, coding-decoding, etc.

Part C: Numerical Ability

Questions cover Number Systems, Computation of Whole Numbers, Decimals, Fractions, Percentages, Ratio and Proportion, Averages, Interest, Profit and Loss, Discount, Mensuration, Time and Distance, Time and Work, etc.

Part D: Road Sense, Vehicle Maintenance and Traffic Rules

Questions related to Road Sense, Vehicle Maintenance, Traffic Rules, Signals, Signages, and vehicle & environmental pollution (including petrol, diesel, and CNG vehicles), noise pollution, and related topics.

Physical Endurance and Measurement Test (PE&MT):

The standard of Physical Endurance and Measurement Tests are as follows:

Physical Endurance Test:

Standard of Physical Endurance Test for candidates including ex-servicemen and Departmental candidates (age-wise):

Age | Race (1600 meters) | Long Jump | High Jump

Up to 30 years | 7 minutes | 12½ feet (12'6") | 3½ feet (3'6")

Above 30 to 40 years | 8 minutes | 11½ feet (11'6") | 3¼ feet (3'3")

Above 40 years | 9 minutes | 10½ feet (10'6") | 3 feet (3')

Candidates must clear the race to be eligible for Long Jump and High Jump. Each jump must be cleared in any one of the three chances given. There is no appeal against disqualification in race, Long Jump, and High Jump.

Physical Measurement Test:

Physical Measurement Test is conducted only for candidates who qualify Physical Endurance Tests. Standards for Male candidates:

Height: Minimum 170 cm, relaxable by 5 cm for residents of specified hill areas, ST

candidates, and sons of serving/retired/deceased Delhi Police personnel or Multi-Tasking Staff.

Chest: Minimum 81 cm with 4 cm expansion (i.e., 81-85 cm), relaxable by 5 cm for the same categories as height.

Relaxation is allowed only upon production of requisite certificate.

Candidates failing to meet physical standards may appeal on the same day to the Appellate Authority. The decision is final and no further appeal is entertained.

Trade Test (Qualifying):

Candidates who qualify PE&MT will be called for the Trade Test. Driving licenses will be verified online via DigiLocker, and only candidates with genuine licenses will be allowed to appear in the Trade Test. Legal action will be taken against candidates with forged licenses. The Trade Test is qualifying in nature and carries 150 marks. Candidates must score minimum qualifying marks in each part to proceed further.

Medical Standard:

Candidates should be of sound health, free from disease/defect/deformity.

Better eye vision 6/6 without glasses, worse eye 6/12 without glasses. Free from color blindness. No relaxation allowed.

Selected candidates will be medically examined by doctors in selected Government hospitals in Delhi as per prescribed standards under Delhi Police (Appointment & Recruitment) Rules, 1980, as amended.
