- Total Time: 30 minutes for both tasks
- Mode: Computer-based typing

Essay Writing for IBPS PO

An essay is a short piece of writing on a particular topic. What sets an essay apart is not just being error-free in grammar and spelling, but also the structure and flow of ideas. A basic but ideal structure to follow is:

1) Introduction

- Briefly introduce the topic and its background
- Mention your view on the topic before elaborating in the body paragraphs



2) Body Paragraphs

- Present your points of view in detail, 2–3 paragraphs only
- List examples supporting your view
- Put forth your strongest argument first, followed by the next
- Each paragraph should contain one idea with supporting sentences

3) Conclusion

- Restate your main argument/view by showing connections between points
- Do not introduce new ideas; summarize using strongest evidence

New Pattern

How to Write a Good Essay? (Step-by-Step)

Although it may seem like a waste of time, it is important to spend a few minutes planning before writing. If you have 15 minutes for one essay, spending about 5 minutes planning can save time while typing. Steps to write a good essay:

- Understand the Topic: Read carefully, decide your stance (for/against/balanced), identify keywords like "impact," "role," "challenges"
- **Plan Before You Type:** Spend 2–3 minutes outlining introduction, 2–3 arguments/examples, and conclusion
- **Introduction (40–50 words):** Define the topic, provide context, use relevant facts or quotes, clearly state approach
- Body Paragraphs (150–180 words): Write 2–3 paragraphs, each discussing one point supported with examples, arrange arguments logically
- **Balanced Approach:** Avoid personal pronouns, use formal language, cover pros and cons if applicable, avoid bias unless required
- Conclusion (40–50 words): Summarize main ideas, end with solutionoriented or forward-looking statement, do not introduce new points

A Good (Sample) Essay with Analysis

Comprehension for IBPS PO

Reading Comprehension is a key part of the IBPS PO descriptive section. It tests your ability to read, understand, and interpret passages, and answer questions. Success depends on speed, accuracy, vocabulary, and understanding of the main idea, tone, and context.

How to Tackle Comprehension (Step-by-Step)

• **Preview the Passage:** Glance at the first and last sentences of each paragraph to get the gist. Identify topic, purpose, and tone.



- **Read Actively:** Underline key points, note relationships between ideas: contrast, cause-effect, sequence, or comparison.
- Understand the Question Type:
 - Direct/Fact-Based: Answer is explicitly stated
 - o Inference-Based: Answer is implied
 - o Summary/Theme: Identify central idea
 - Vocabulary in Context: Understand meaning from surrounding sentences
- Eliminate Wrong Options: Remove irrelevant or distorted options, focus on subtle wording differences
- Answer Clearly and Concisely: Avoid adding opinions unless asked; justify answers with passage evidence
